

Interactive map tracks World Cup parties in the Toronto area

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Now you can track World Cup parties in Toronto in real time thanks to an online tool.

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To help soccer fans ensure they don't miss out on all the fun, Amsterdam startup Dashmote has launched [Watch Party Radar](#), an interactive map that tracks World Cup screenings and watch

parties across the GTA. Users can look up venue and event descriptions and special offers at hundreds of locations across town.

The map is free to use, updated daily and will continue to list venues and events through to the World Cup final on July 19.

Team-specific searches available

Fan of a certain team? Watch Party Radar has you covered, too. You can search which venues are holding watch parties in support of your country.

The city has come alive for this year's World Cup with thousands coming from across the world to cheer on their teams, especially on game days when matches are held at Toronto Stadium (a.k.a. BMO Field).

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The big one: Portugal vs. Croatia

Thursday should see an even bigger party as Toronto hosts fans for the round of 32 match between Portugal and Croatia — two countries that boast large communities in and around the GTA.

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With stars such as Portugal's Cristiano Ronaldo and Croatia's Luka Modric hitting town for the matchup, this could be a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for both of those communities. And the stakes couldn't be higher: The winner moves on to the round of 16. The loser goes home.

But that match won't come cheap if you want to go. [Reports](#) have ticket prices higher than \$30,000 on resale websites such as SeatGeek and Stubhub. Both websites were added to Ontario's "Consumer Beware" website by the province due to sky-high ticket resale prices.

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
